# Coral Rag 10

The publishing group within the Marcham Society have been working hard and have accepted contributions on a range of subjects within the spheres of interest of the Society.

From local history we have articles concerning the first half of the twentieth century, ranging from WW1 and its impact on Marcham, another on Cothill School before and after WW1, the golden age of cycling around Marcham and surrounding areas in the 1920s.

Many of our members will remember Bernard Higgins and we are including a transcript of his reminiscences as recorded by Sheila Dunford. In the archaeology section we include the recently excavated Anson Field and the Big Leas field walking. Lastly, from our natural environment, an article on English hedgerows and our regular Plants of the Parish section. There is also an ancient Roman recipe that can still be made today - 'Modern Marcham Mulsum'.

The Institute has been a feature on North Street for very many years built by the Anson Trust in the early twentieth century.

Everything except the façade will be demolished very shortly as part of the development of the Anson Field and the new village hall.

# Village Model Rescued from Demolition.

I was passing the Institute on the afternoon of the 20th August and noticed that the doors were open and I wandered in. There were three workmen there and they had a handmade model of the village, that they had found, sitting on a table in the hall. The Institute is about to be demolished and this model was destined for the skip, so I asked to have it and they said no problem. It measures 4ft across and is 5ft 5in long, and it needs some repair work as well.

It was made by the Cubs some years ago, under supervision from Chris Ricketts, after Kings Avenue was built, but before any of the recent housing developments. Transport away from the Institute was an issue, but the workmen (pictured) kindly lashed it to their (rather large) forklift truck and it currently sits in the Chairmen's garage waiting a new home., rescued from the demolition. A local history disaster averted.



Thanks to these men and their forklift we rescued the model of the village.
