Vale Community Award

The event took place in the hall at the Beacon in Wantage with around a hundred people attending. The ceremony, which took place after an official lunch, lasted an hour with over thirty other people being acknowledged for their contribution to various communities around the Vale. Each of these people received a eulogy, a certificate, and a commemorative trophy from the Chairman of the Vale of the White Horse District Council, Monica Lovatt.

Marcham Parish Council nominated Dr. Eric Dunford and Mr. Simon Blackmore on behalf of a team of volunteers involved in the Trendles project Marcham, for recognition under the Vale Chairman's Community Award Scheme. Local landowners, farming in Marcham, were aware of possible Roman and other remains on their land and allowed initial investigations which revealed some artefacts. Eric and Simon became interested, and as Trustees of the 'Vale of White Horse & Ridgeway Archaeological & Historical Trust' helped to support investigation of

the history of the Vale. They were successful in securing funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund to enable archaeologists from Oxford University to explore further. As the dig progressed, more and more remains were found. They have worked well together with groups of keen volunteers, Eric taking an interest in "bone" items and with Simon's curiosity in "pottery". They have both played a significant part in setting up the computer databases, and in the recording and analysis of the finds, using stratigraphy and relative dating systems.

The Vale is rich in history and Eric and Simon have brought this to many people by arranging exhibitions of the items found, in Abingdon museum, Wantage and Marcham. They have given talks to local organisations and particularly in schools, helping the next generation understand what life was like in the Vale 2000 years ago. As well as being part of a wider team of volunteers, they have both been a vital link between those undertaking the archaeological dig and the expert archaeologists writing the reports, as with-

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out the recording and analysis of the data the effort of the dig would have been wasted. Their voluntary efforts have bene-

fitted all sections of the wider community of the Vale, by enabling a greater understanding of the history of the area. Marcham Parish Council has no

hesitation in recommending them for recognition of their achievements.
