



"Stonyborow - a clue to Roman settlement in rural Oxfordshire?"



Abigail Lloyd researches the historical landscape, focussing particularly on old buildings, churches and the bigger picture revealed through Early Medieval and Medieval place-names. Some field names have been lost, yet they are still recoverable from past records. They are valuable sources for the history of a landscape and its people.

During her analysis of field-names and charter bounds of Whitehill Township, Tackley, Oxfordshire, she lighted upon one field name in particular, '*Stonyborow*' that she found of particular interest.

In her talk Abigail led us through the evidence to be found in manuscripts, on old and modern maps and also in existing place-names. In the end she showed how her research had led to the location of a Roman Settlement near Akeman Street, a site that was confirmed by crop marks and Roman artifacts found by archaeological field walking.
