

The talk with a PowerPoint slide show describes a year in the life of bats from birth to hibernation and work done by the Oxfordshire Bat Group. David Endacott will describe the bats and will discuss the populations in Oxfordshire, their conservation needs, activities and surveys carried out at roost sites.



David works with the Oxfordshire Bat Group which provides a rescue service for grounded, sick or injured bats with the aim of getting them back into the wild whenever possible. Captive injured bats will be shown after the talk including 'Norman', the noctule rescued from Cothill Woods.

Our Outing on 18th October



Tour of Nuffield Place Home of Sir William Morris Wednesday 18th October 10.30 & 10.50am

Following our talk by Marie Louise Kerr in June, we have arranged two tours of Lord Nuffield's home at Nuffield, in the Chiltern Hills, 4 miles east of Wallingford. William Morris began his career as an apprentice to a bicycle repairer in Oxford in the 1880's and became one of the greatest industrialists and philanthropists of his time. The house was completed in 1914, enlarged in 1933 and he lived there until his death in 1963. It was originally bequeathed to Nuffield College and later given to the National Trust who manage it today.

We have arranged two guided tours of the house for a maximum of 8 people on each tour. Tours are 45 mins long, one at 10.30 and then one at 10.50am. Following the tour there will be a chance to explore the beautiful gardens. For National Trust members the tours are free but non-members will be charged £11 on entry.

After the visit we invite members to have lunch at the *Maker Space Café* at the Old Crown Pub on the left side of the A4130 on the way home. This is an interesting place, as not only is it a cafe but also a craft centre, recently featured on TV.


- Called "Alfred" he was Aelfred

Jim Asher gave a summary of astronomical news and showed photos taken during the summer...




