

# **The Astronomy Meeting on Wednesday 15th October**

Following the round-up of News and Members Matter images over the last month, the main feature of the meeting was the talk by Patrick Wallace on 'Close Encounters of the Telescope Kind'.

Patrick's talk was a fascinating set of anecdotes from his life, starting from early influences, school days when he made his own telescope, including hand grinding the mirror, and an astronomy degree course at UCL, which he scraped through because it was mainly

astrophysics which was not his main interest. He accidentally arrived in a career in computing with EMI, and another accident led to him to a computing job at the 3.9m Anglo-Australian Telescope in New South Wales, developing pointing software for the telescope. This was so successful that software based on his work has been used to point many telescopes elsewhere, including the new Vera C. Rubin Observatory opened this year.



His talk was peppered with stories of famous people he has met, observatories he has worked at and some of his many adventures on the way, including what happens if you drive a car in Australia that doesn't have 'Roo-bars'!

My take-away line from the talk was his quote from the American philosopher, Nicholas Murray Butler that:

"An expert is one who knows more and more about less and less until he knows absolutely everything about nothing."

Patrick claimed that he had become such an expert, although his talk demonstrated otherwise and showed his skill as an entertainer.



#### "The Port of Wantage" by Sem Seaborne

Why would anyone want to bring boats into Wantage and continue doing it for 85 years? This talk was the story of why it was vital, the difficulties in achieving it and the impact it had on life in Wantage, including some outcomes that were unintentional.

We discovered the effect that canal 'visitors' had in the days when the best faggots in Berkshire could be found at the Jolly Waterman on Wantage Wharf.

The talk was given by Dr. Sem Seaborne - a volunteer at the Vale & Downland Museum in Wantage. He spoke enthusiastically about the history of the Wiltshire and Berkshire Canal, explaining how 19th century Wantage as a thriving market town was at that time more important than Swindon.

Gradually the canal gave way to the railways but Sem showed us that there were still vestiges of the original canal to be seen around Wantage. He then finished by quoting a 1938 poem by Reginald Arkell:-


The old canal from bank to bank, Is filled with weeds and rushes rank; And down this lane of living green, March memories of what has been.
